Memorial Day Parade and Ceremony Set

The annual Memorial Day parade and ceremony, sponsored by VFW Post 3345, will take place again this year on Monday, May 27.

The parade will step off at 11 a.m. from St. Joseph Church and head south on Pearl Road to the Commons.

It will be followed by a short ceremony there. (Please note the new location due to Town Center construction).

The Strongsville Historical Village will be open from 11:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. that day, with tours, crafts for kids, refreshments and a Gold Star tree to honor fallen soldiers.

Rib Burnoff, Homecoming Right Around the Corner

Strongsville's two major summer events will take place in June and July, drawing tens of thousands of visitors to the Commons.

First is the Strongsville City Club Rib Burnoff, which will run June 20-22 and feature award-winning ribs from restaurants around the nation.

There will also be plenty of other food, inflatables for the kids and entertainment each day, including Follow the Sun, Boaterhead and Muddy River Project.

In addition, on Friday, June 21, there will be a fireworks show, visible from the Commons. All entertainment is included in



the \$5 admission.

The Homecoming festival takes over the Commons July 24-27 with food, carnival games, rides and nightly entertainment.

Admission is free for both the midway and the entertainment. Ride tickets are available for purchase

The event, sponsored by the Strongsville Chamber of Commerce, ends with a bang — a spectacular fireworks display on Saturday, July 27.

It will be the third fireworks show on the Commons this summer. The Fourth of July display will again take place there this year.

Roads Closed as Work on Roundabout Continues

Remember, roads leading to the Town Center area are closed as crews work on a roundabout to replace the three-way stop at Zverina, Westwood and Roe.

Access to the Rec Center can only be made from Royalton Road, using the Target (Greens of Strongsville) entrance.



The only way to get to the police station or Strongsville Library is from Westwood Drive, off Pearl Road.

And Zverina Lane will take you only as far as the Strongsville Food Bank. The city Communication Center and Historical Village can also be reached from Zverina.

The construction is expected to last till July.

Work also continues on the new Town Center playground, pavilion and other amenities.
