Strongsville Welcomes ODOT-NOACA Traffic Study

he Ohio Department of Transportation and Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency will conduct a traffic study aimed at congestion in Southern Cuyahoga County and Northern Medina County.

The study will focus on the need for potential roadway improvements and new infrastructure to support the continued growth in the area.

Strongsville officials said they look forward to working with both ODOT and NOACA, as well as other regional stakeholders, throughout the upcoming process.

The study, which was announced by ODOT in April,



will look at options to reduce traffic tie-ups around the Cuyahoga-Medina border.

"Congestion continues to be an issue in this area and ODOT is committed to working with all stakeholders involved to find a reasonable solution that everyone can agree with," said ODOT Director Jack Marchbanks.

The agencies plan to hire a consultant to develop a congestion management plan to come up with conceptual alternatives to alleviate traffic congestion and identify a plan with solutions.

The study and plan could begin later in 2024 and will take up to two years to complete.

The band will also play at a Strongsville Rotary event at the Senior Center Aug. 2.


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

Eight Residential Streets Getting Repairs

ork is under way on the city's 2024 pavement rehabilitation program, which has identified eight residential streets for concrete replacement and repair.

Find a Baby Animal? Leave it Alone — Mom is Nearby

t's the season for baby animals to be born, and Animal Control Officer Chuck McCleary has some advice if you see a youngster in your yard: Leave it alone.

McCleary said mother deer often leave fawns alone for hours at a time while they go out to look for food.

The fawns don't emit a scent vet and are safe.

If you see baby bunnies, raccoons, kittens or other animals, don't assume they've been abandoned.

"Mom is nearby," he said.

"Don't box them up and run them to a rehabilitation center."

Also, don't give them food and water.

If you don't want wildlife in your yard, McCleary can offer tips on animal-proofing rather than calling a service to cage them. Call (440) 580-3180 for more information.
